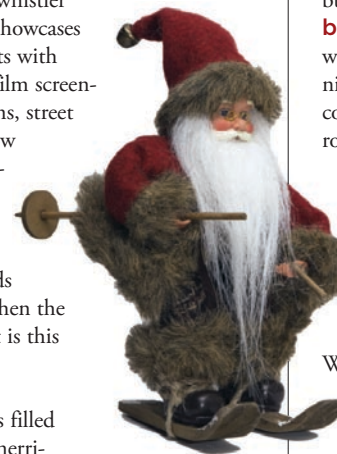

Gay pride is strong in Whistler, and nowhere is that more evident than at **WinterPride** (Feb. 1 to 8; [www.gaywhistler.com](http://www.gaywhistler.com)). Highlights of the 17th annual Gay Ski Week include a fashion show, comedy night, winemaker dinners and, of course, skiing.

Marking the one-year countdown to the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games, the **Whistler Winter Arts Festival** (Feb. 1 to Mar. 23; [www.whistlerartscouncil.com](http://www.whistlerartscouncil.com)) showcases the performing arts with literary readings, film screenings, art exhibitions, street performances, snow sculpting and concerts by acts such as The Paperboys and Wide Mouth Mason. Who needs Olympic sports when the live entertainment is this delightful?

Tiny Pemberton is filled with revelry and merriment during the **Pemberton Winterfest Street Party** (Feb. 14 to 15; [www.pembertonwinterfest.com](http://www.pembertonwinterfest.com)), a family-friendly weekend bursting with concerts, sports, West Coast cuisine, local art and hands-on workshops.



Squamish's annual **Wild at Art Festival** (Mar. 6 to 15; [www.wildatart.ca](http://www.wildatart.ca)) brings a splash of colour to the area. Appropriately enough, this year's theme is "Local Colour," which is sure to be provided by local musicians, dancers, artists and chefs.

The ski season may be winding down in Apr., but the **Telus World Ski and Snowboard Festival** (Apr. 17 to 26; [www.whistler.com/wssf](http://www.whistler.com/wssf)) is just gearing up. Ski bunnies flock to this annual 10-day event for the competitions, concerts and—most of all—the rockin' nightlife.

Whistler's sporting venues are being put through their paces before the 2010 Winter Games by hosting some **big sports competitions** this season. Check out the FIS Nordic Combined World Cup (Jan. 16 to 17), FIS Cross-Country Skiing World Cup (Jan. 16 to 18), FIS Ski Jumping World Cup (Jan. 24 to 25), IPC Cross-Country Skiing and Biathlon World Cup Final (Mar. 4 to 7) and IBU Biathlon World Cup (Mar. 11 to 15), all in Whistler Olympic Park; FIBT Bobsleigh & Skeleton World Cup (Feb. 2 to 7) and FIL Luge World Cup (Feb. 16 to 21) at The Whistler Sliding Centre; and IPC Alpine Skiing World Cup Finals (Mar. 9 to 14) at Whistler Creekside.
